#### Environmental + Climate Committee Update (Joanne Boger and Alice Boles Ott)

- Big bills have not gotten over the finish line
- CCIA
  - Would collect fees on carbon
  - Would use the \$15 billion as a spur for climate justice
  - Received support from senate and assembly but leadership was not ready to move it onto the floor
  - Significant opposition on Long Island and upstate re: gas taxes
- Public Renewables Act and Clean Futures Act gained momentum but did not cross the finish line
- City Council: Gas-Free NYC bill
  - Would ban any new infrastructure for gas
  - o There are many projects that companies are trying to modernize and build
  - Big move to have city council deny these activities
- Save Our Sunlight
  - Monday night testimony
  - There were 600 people registered to testify
  - Alice presented CBID's testimony
  - Marvin testified in his personal capacity
  - Testimony was overwhelmingly against the high-rise building
  - Unions, especially builder's union, testified in favor
  - Ethan from Brooklyn Botanic Garden said Community Board 9 overwhelmingly passed a resolution disapproving the project without any modification
  - Now has to go before the Brooklyn Borough President
  - Alice will try to reread our testimony
  - Not done yet but looking good that developer will not be able to go forward

## Electoral Update (Julie Kerr and Ariel Merkel)

Key dates coming up

- Delays in releasing results are largely due to absentee ballots, not ranked choice voting
- o BOE will release preliminary RCV rounds for all races starting next Tuesday, June 29
  - Tuesday release will just be in-person early voting and Election Day in-person voting
  - June 29 update will not encompass absentees
- July 6: another set of RCV for all races that will include the absentee and affidavit ballots
- Turnout was pretty good!
  - o Mayoral primary: in person on June 22 and during early voting period: 853,825 ballots
  - Just under 800,000 ballots (before absentees) were from the Democratic primary
  - o 692,000 people voted in Democratic primary in 2013
  - There are 221,000 absentee ballots citywide
  - As of close of business yesterday (June 23), about 105,000 absentee ballots were returned
  - Just over 100,000 are for Democratic absentee ballots
  - o In Brooklyn, BOE sent out 54,700 absentee ballots
  - BOE will accept absentee ballots through next Tuesday (June 29) as long as they were postmarked by June 22
  - We might see close to 1,000,000 people turn out for this primary election

- Ariel's presentation
  - She is the ADA Coordinator for the NYC BOE
  - She provides an accessible version of the absentee ballot
  - Reiterated that the delay in releasing results is not related to RCV, it's because of the built-in delay needed to count absentee ballots that were postmarked by June 22
  - People have seven business days to cure any issues related to absentee ballot envelopes
  - o RCV process: an algorithm counts all of it
  - o RCV counting is instantaneous
  - If you vote via absentee, you can then vote at your poll site, and the BOE won't open your absentee ballot
  - o Returns might not all be valid
  - Just because absentee ballots are returned doesn't mean they will ultimately count because some of those voters could have decided to vote in person
- Q&A
  - If the delay in publishing returns is due to voters returning absentee ballots, why is the BOE telling us that there will be weekly releases of rankings?
    - On Tuesday, it'll be the release of EV and ED in-person tallies
    - And then afterward it'll be in-person and absentee
    - People are eager for results
    - This is a way for the BOE to appease the public and campaigns and show that things are happening

End-of-session legislative update (Assemblymember Jo Anne Simon)

- NYS Legislative Session ended on June 10 (well, really June 11 at 4:00 in the morning)
- Passed a bill that would allow NYS to monitor excessive bus weights on BQE

- Electronic monitoring
- Started being used in other parts of the country
- Couldn't use it on the BQE before because needed state approval
- o BQE is deteriorating, particularly the triple cantilever
- o Buys time to be able to keep roadway open long enough to figure out planning
- o Amount of enforcement that can be done is currently limited
- Huge personnel issue

# - Firearms legislation

- Research institute funded on a regular basis going forward
- o Pay for gun violence research by payoff on state taxes
- Way for the public to contribute to conducting gun violence research as a matter of public health

# - Whistleblower protections

- Whistleblower protection for people who have been retaliated against for calling attention to fraud, abuse, discrimination in the workplace
- o Before, had to prove the reported conduct was a violation of the law
- So, for example, violations of executive orders previously didn't count
- o People had raised issues about the lack of PPE but there was no relevant law, only an EO
- Includes availability of damages

#### - Q&A

- o New York Health Act what happened? Why was it stymied?
  - Wasn't passed in the Senate. Passed in the Assembly.
  - Jo Anne Simon doesn't know precisely what happened
  - Senate is still a bit more conservative
  - A lot of those Democratic seats were flipped from Republican to Democratic control, and those members are in more purple districts
  - We also didn't get marijuana legislation
- No longer under emergency COVID orders as of today
  - o Remote notarization executive orders are expiring, and notaries are sounding the alarm
  - Legislature is trying to pass legislation on it now to continue allowing remote notarization

## - BBP campaign update

- Jo Anne did not come out on top in #1s
- With number of absentees, those will tend to skew toward voters in areas where Jo Anne is strong
- She may overtake Cornegy on absentees
- o They didn't get to the 52<sup>nd</sup> AD until the very end
- o Possible that 44<sup>th</sup>, 52<sup>nd</sup>, 57<sup>th</sup> ADs will not be counted until later
- We figure it will take some time
- We are anticipating not knowing very much/a final analysis until July 12
- O Depending on RCV, some people were ranking only 1 or only 2
- o People tended to focus on city council and the mayor's race

- BBP was an afterthought in a lot of people's minds because it's an amorphous position and there hasn't been a competitive BBP election since 2001, so voters weren't used to voting for that position
- We don't know how many absentee voters voted in the BBP race
- o So far, 100,000 fewer people voted for other races than voted for mayor's race
- Numbers will shift but we don't know how many people voted for a #2
- There were 12 candidates, and the vast majority did not crack into double digits in terms of first-place rankings
- We don't yet know who those voters' 2s and 3s were
- o It was a hard-fought race, and it would have been better to see higher numbers
- Jo Anne got into the race late and there were already endorsements and promises made
- Gender and age are still barriers
- o Jo Anne feels good about the race her campaign ran
- People have been calling and telling her what a good race she ran
- Rich commented that CBID is proud to have supported Jo Anne and honored to have played a role in the campaign
- Jo Anne said it was gratifying to have the support of CBID and many reform Democratic clubs as well as a broad base of support throughout the borough
- Disappointing how big a barrier gender still is
- People gravitate toward a male depiction of leadership or what is an interesting comment
- Some folks were reacting to completely empty statements during forums
- Difficult to overcome subtle barriers
- Like how it's difficult to overcome structural racism when you have been acculturated in a racist society
- U.S. society has also skewed very male
- Women's leadership would bring our society forward
